## PART I PRELIMINARY PROVISIONS

Citation

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Veterinary (Internship for Paraprofessional) Regulations, 2020.

Scope of Application 2. These Regulations shall apply to paraprofessional who intends to be enrolled in Mainland Tanzania.

Interpretatio n Cap. 319 3. In these Regulations, unless the context otherwise requires-

"Act" means the Veterinary Act;

"Council" means the Veterinary Council of Tanzania established under the Act;

"Paraprofessional" has the meaning ascribed to it under the Act;

"paraprofessional intern" means a paraprofessional who has recently graduated from a recognized paraprofessional training institution and who is attached to a work to gain veterinary

paraprofessional hands on skills;

"internship" means an official or formal programme to provide practical experience for graduating veterinary paraprofessionals;

"host institution" means a public or private registered institution established by law that provides

opportunities for veterinary paraprofessionals to undertake internship;

"mentor" means a qualified person with experience in the host institution, who is assigned to ensure a smooth facilitation of the paraprofessional intern, leads and advises in the matchmaking process between the intern and host institution and who monitors the progress of internship;

"Minister" means the Minister responsible for livestock;

"Registrar" means the Registrar of the Council appointed under section 8 of the Act.

#### PART II INTERNSHIP

Objectives of internsh

- 4. The objectives of the internship for veterinary paraprofessionals shall be-
  - (a) to ensure that veterinary paraprofessionals who join veterinary practice acquire requisite "all round" paraprofessional hands on skills for better provision of service to the public;
  - (b) to enable veterinary paraprofessionals to have an opportunity to consolidate their knowledge, skills and attitudes to enable them to be competent in their duties;
  - (c) to provide the paraprofessionals with the valuable work experience and skills to enhance their employability.

Require ment to underta ke internsh ip

- 5.-(1) A prospective paraprofessional intern shall report to the Council for recognition within three months from the date of completion of his studies.
- (2) A graduate paraprofessional shall, before being enrolled as paraprofessional, be required to undertake internship work by working under supervision of experienced professionals or veterinary specialists in the veterinary disciplines.
- (3) The paraprofessional intern shall be required to perform various paraprofessional duties such as disease

diagnoses and other forms of veterinary services under the supervision and guidance of a mentor.

(4) The paraprofessional intern shall also provide professional services in health camps, if any, and providing services in "hard to reach areas" for purpose of internship under the supervision of the mentor.

Applicati on for internship placement

- 6.-(1) A graduate paraprofessional shall apply for internship placement by fill in and submit an application form set out in the First Schedule to these Regulations and shall be accompanied by copies of birth certificate, institution transcript and letter of introduction from the Institute.
- (2) An applicant shall be required to pay internship placement fee of ten thousand shillings.
- (3) The Registrar may, in determining the application submitted under subregulation (1)-
  - (a) grant the application and issue a certificate of paraprofessional internship placement set out in the Second Schedule to these Regulations;
  - (b) refuse the application and give reasons thereon.
- (4) The Registrar shall, after determining the application under subregulation (3), submit such applications to the Council for final determination.
- (5) Graduate veterinary paraprofessionals interns shall work in identified host institutions for a period of six months following the prescribed arrangement.
- (6) A graduate veterinary paraprofessionals may be allowed to postpone internship for a reason of attending further studies.

List of paraprofe ssional interns

- 7.-(1) The Council shall cause to be kept a list of paraprofessional interns admitted for internship placement.
- (2) The list kept under subregulation (1) shall contain-

- (a) names, qualifications, places where qualifications were obtained, date of obtaining the qualifications and any other detail as may be determined by the Council;
- (b) address where the paraprofessional intern can be contacted; and
- (c) particulars for internship work including date of commencement and completion.

# Removal from list

- 8.-(1) The Registrar may remove from the list of paraprofessional interns the name of a paraprofessional intern who-
  - (a) has completed internship to the satisfaction of the Council and has been issued with a certificate of completion set out in the Third Schedule to these Regulations;
  - (b) has not completed the internship to the satisfaction of the Council;
  - (c) has discontinued his internship with the consent of the Council;
  - (d) no longer complies with the requirements and conditions for registration as a paraprofessional intern; or
  - (e) is a deceased.
- (2) A person whose name has been removed from the list of paraprofessional interns shall be notified thereof and any identity card issued shall be deemed to be cancelled.

# Restoration of names in list

- 9.-(1) A paraprofessional intern whose name has been removed from the list may have his name restored into the list by submitting to the Registrar the following documents:
  - (a) a duly completed application form;
  - (b) acceptable documentary evidence of compliance with the conditions under which he may be provisionally enrolled; and
  - (c) acceptable documentary evidence from a mentor

to the effect that he have resumed his internship.

(2) A person whose name has been restored in the list shall be required to pay a prescribed fee and issued with an identity card

Conduct of internship 10.-(1) The arrangement of internship shall involve graduate veterinary paraprofessionals rotating within the identified entities such as clinics, farms and laboratories that are supposed to provide competencies in clinical practice and laboratory diagnosis.

(2) A graduate veterinary paraprofessionals shall be required to spend two months in veterinary clinics and field service, two months in farms, districts and rural areas and two months in laboratories or other area that may be prescribed by the Council.

(3) The host institutions shall provide core competency in the areas prescribed in the subregulation (2) by allocating mentors to guide paraprofessional interns.

(4) The mentor shall ensure that paraprofessional interns acquire the requisite hands-on skills and interpersonal attributes in the respective field.

(5) The paraprofessional interns shall be rotated in different areas of a farm unit or veterinary facility under the following conditions-

(a) there must be at least one approved mentor responsible for the effective practical training;

(b) facilities (farm unit or veterinary practice facility) for rotation shall be approved and recorded by Council and each facility shall have a veterinarian or approved mentor to supervise a paraprofessional intern;

(c) the facility (farm unit or veterinary practice facility) where such rotation would take place for purposes of practical training, the period(s) that such services would be provided, as well as the name of the mentor under whose supervision the intern would work, shall be clearly indicated in the contract to be approved by the Council before internship commences;

- (d) the rotation shall be for practical training purposes only; and
- (e) an approved mentor shall not delegate the supervisory function to another person.
- (6) The internship contract may be ceded to another approved tutor at the same farm unit, animal health premise or institution or at another approved facility, premise or institution on the occurrence of any of the following events:
  - (a) the death of the mentor, the sequestration of their estate, their conviction of a serious offence, their suspension or the removal of their name from the register of veterinarians;
  - (b) the discontinuation of practise of the mentor or the resignation from the veterinary or institution approved for internship;
  - (c) the closure of the veterinary or institution;
  - (d) mutual consent between the mentor and the community service provider for a reason which is acceptable to the Registrar; or
  - (e) any other reason that the Council may consider necessary.
- (7) The council shall recognize the period of internship undertaken by a paraprofessional intern under the original registered mentor and the new mentor.
- (8) A paraprofessional intern who intends to cede a contract to another mentor shall, at least seven days before such cession, submit the following applicable documents to the Council:
  - (a) the application for cession of contract of community service;
  - (b) the mentor application (if not approved).
- (9) The council shall recognize any period that the paraprofessional intern spent in a farm, as part of the internship programme in a facility or promise which was approved for purposes of internship.
- (10) A paraprofessional intern shall provide work support required in host institutions, their engagement in practical training and provisional of services to enhance their

practical skills.

- (11) A paraprofessional intern shall also be required to provide the needed support in disease surveillance, diagnostic systems and control that are carried out by the host institutions.
- (12) A paraprofessional intern may, under special circumstances, be allowed to postpone a component of the internship rotation which he shall be required to complete it before enrollment.
- (13) A paraprofessional intern shall repeat a failed internship rotation before he can proceeding to the next rotation.
- (14) A paraprofessional intern shall, where he failed a single internship rotation more than two times, be required to undertake remedial training in a recognized veterinary training institution for failed specialty.

Monitorin g and evaluation of internship

- 11.-(1) The assessment of a paraprofessional intern shall be conducted on a systematic and regular basis with positive reinforcement on appropriate performance and constructive criticism on performance for improvement.
- (2) A paraprofessional intern shall receive an accurate feedback on their performance as reflected in daily and less regular assessments.
- (3) A paraprofessional intern shall provide evidence that he has achieved the required standard.
- (4) The assessment of the performance of a paraprofessional intern in farm unit, premise or facility shall be conducted on the following occasions and in the following manner:
  - (a) on a day-to-day basis by the mentor in the execution of daily duties and activities and which is not necessarily recorded;
  - (b) on the professional development of a paraprofessional intern, shall assessed at 12, 24, 36 and 45 weeks of the programme;
  - (c) a set of oral experience checklist completed, at 24 and 45 weeks of the programme to assess the

- level of competence of a paraprofessional intern within the sector:
- (d) an assessment of the outcomes achieved by a paraprofessional intern, at 45 weeks of the programme.
- (5) In the assessment of a paraprofessional intern, the mentor shall use the following guidelines to determine the development of an intern in a particular task:
  - (a) test knowledge (whether they do know what they are doing);
  - (b) test competence (whether they are able to perform the tasks and at which rate);
  - (c) test efficiency (whether they can be relied upon to perform a task accurately and safely within a reasonable time);
  - (d) determine if the skills, knowledge and values they acquire can be used and transferred to different circumstances;
  - (e) assess the performance within the context of the competencies required of a veterinary paraprofessional at entry level.
- (6) A paraprofessional intern shall, in an integrated approach to assessment aimed at assessing knowledge, understanding, problem solving, technical skills, attitudes and ethics, be evaluated in the following areas:
  - (a) technical knowledge of veterinary medicine, problem solving, the application of theoretical concepts to practical problems;
  - (b) organizational ability to plan, attention to detail, ability to meet deadline;
  - (c) communication, clarity of written communications, ability to work within a team, effectiveness of oral communications;
  - (d) attitudes initiative, willingness to accept responsibility, ability to follow instructions.
- (7) An internship assessment report shall be prepared by fill in an assessment form set out in the Fourth Schedule to these Regulations.

## PART III MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Internship funding arrangem ent

- 12.-(1) Funding of internship shall be borne by the paraprofessional intern.
- (2) Notwithstanding the provisions of subregulation (1) funding of internship may be provided by the employer, parents or any other means.

Offences and penalties 13. Any person who contravenes or fails to comply with any provision under these Regulations shall not be enrolled and shall not be allowed to practice.
